IAS FACULTY EMILY ROOK-KOEPSEL AND MARIAM MUFTI



Emily Rook-Koepsel is an Assistant Professor in the Department of International and Area Studies. Dr. Rook-Koepsel focuses on the history of cultural and minority nationalism in India, specifically considering the ways that mass-media and minority organizations worked to redefine terms like democracy, nation, and unity during the uncertainty of the push for independence in the 1940s and the restructuring of independent India in the 1950s. Dr. Rook-Koepsel teaches courses on colonialism, modern India,

women and gender in South Asia, and mass media in India. In 2002, she received her B.A. in history and South Asian Languages and Civilizations from the University of Chicago, and earned her Ph.D. in History at the University of Minnesota in 2010.



Mariam Mufti is an Assistant Professor in the Department of International and Area Studies. A comparative political scientist by training, she works on regime change and political participation in hybrid regimes. In particular Dr. Mufti's research focuses on the role of the military and political parties in the processes of recruitment and selection of the political elite in Pakistan as a way to understand the behavior of political leadership and regime dynamics. Dr. Mufti teaches courses on domestic

and international politics in South Asia and U.S. foreign policy towards Pakistan and Afghanistan. She received her Ph.D. (2011) and M.A. (2006) in political science from Johns Hopkins University.
