John Limbert is Professor of Middle Eastern Studies at the U.S. Naval Academy. Prior to his teaching career he served for thirty-four years as a diplomat in the United States Foreign Service, with postings in Iran, Iraq, Sudan, Algeria, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates. He served as ambassador to Mauritania from 2000-2003. Ambassador Limbert also holds the Department of States' highest award—the Distinguished Service Award—as well as the Department's Award for Valor, which he received in 1981 after fourteen months as a hostage at the American Embassy in Tehran. He is the author of numerous books, the most recent of which is titled, Negotiating with Iran: Wrestling the Ghosts of History (U.S. Institute of Peace, 2009).
