The Republic of Tajikistan came into being in late 1991 as a state with no historical precedent, after centuries of Russian rule and Turkic dominance. Since then, the Tajik political establishment has sought to create a new national identity for Tajiks, while navigating between their Iranian heritage, Islamic tradition and the challenges of a post-Soviet Central Asia.
