

#### ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA CAMPUSES

#### **UNIVERSITY GOVERNANCE**

The university is a part of the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, which is composed of all higher education institutions supported wholly or in part by state appropriations. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education is the coordinating board for the system.

The university – as part of the public educational system of the state, established by legislative action and supported by annual legislative appropriations – places emphasis on sound scholarship, good citizenship, and the duties of the individual to the community and the commonwealth.

By constitutional enactment, the governance of the university is vested in the OU Board of Regents, a board consisting of seven members appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the State Senate. Each member is appointed to serve for seven years, except when appointed to fill an unexpired term, and is subject to removal from office only as provided by law for the removal of officers not liable to impeachment.

The Oklahoma State Regents and the university regents approve the requirements for admission and graduation, the degrees offered, and the fees and expenses. The boards reserve the right to change these requirements.

#### NORMAN CAMPUS

The central campus and the offices of administration of the University of Oklahoma are located on some 3,500 acres in Norman, a city of more than 100,000 residents. Norman is located near the center of the state, 20 miles south of Oklahoma City, the state capital.

The colleges housed on the Norman campus are University College, the College of Architecture, the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Atmospheric and Geographic Sciences, the Michael F. Price College of Business, the Mewbourne College of Earth and Energy, the Jeannine Rainbolt College of Education, the Gallogly College of Engineering, the Weitzenhoffer Family College of Fine Arts, the Graduate College, the Joe C. and Carole Kerr McClendon Honors College, the College of International Studies, the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication, the College of Law, and the College of Liberal Studies. The Norman campus is also headquarters for the College of Continuing Education, which directs outreach programs throughout the state and around the world.

The Norman campus consists of four sections – central campus, south campus, research campus and north campus. Most of the academic and administrative buildings are located on the central campus, noted for its Cherokee Gothic architecture and award-winning landscaping. Also situated on the central campus are the university residence halls, which includes the construction of residential colleges; Sarkeys Energy Center; University Libraries; Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art; Donald W. Reynolds Performing Arts Center, including historic Holmberg Hall, Rupel Jones Theater; Catlett Music Center, including Sharp Concert Hall and Pitman Recital Hall; Oklahoma Memorial Union; recreational facilities, including the Huston Huffman Physical Fitness Center and the Murray Case Sells Swim Complex; Gaylord Family – Oklahoma Memorial Stadium; the Everest Indoor Training Center; and the Oklahoma Center for Continuing Education, a year-round educational center and conference site. Located one block east of the central campus is the OU Brandt Park and Duck Pond, a recreational area used throughout the year by OU students and Norman residents. David A. Burr Park is conveniently located near residence halls and other recreational facilities.

#### South Campus

Immediately adjacent to central campus is the south campus, site of the College of Law; the OU Foundation; OU Traditions apartments; the world-class Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History; Lloyd Noble Center and parking complex; the John Crain Field at the OU Soccer Complex; the Headington Family Tennis Center; the Jimmie Austin University of Oklahoma Golf Course; L. Dale Mitchell Baseball Park; the Marita Hynes Field – OU Women's Softball Complex; the Sam Viersen Gymnastics Center; and OUr Children's World Learning Center.

#### **Research Campus**

In less than a decade, the 277-acre OU Research Campus has been transformed from an empty field to a thriving economic engine shaped by a community of public and private sector collaborations located in nearly 1 million square feet of occupied space representing \$300 million in investment. Today, the Research Campus brings together 1,700 workers across academic, federal, state and industrial organizations in a mutually beneficial environment.

The National Weather Center, a 257,000 square-foot facility that opened in 2006, anchors the OU Research Campus on the south. The Center houses both academic and federal groups dedicated to forecasting, research and training. The Stephenson Research and Technology Center and the Stephenson Life Sciences Research Center house cutting-edge research in fields including robotics, genomics, bioengineering and the OU Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, which includes a National Institutes of Health-funded structural biology program. A series of five "Partners Place" buildings, totaling 362,000 square-feet, enable the public and private sector collaboration on weather and radar research; innovation and entrepreneurship; and water, climate, and energy. Additionally, a 35,000 square-foot "one of a kind" Radar Innovations Laboratory opened in 2014.

OU's Research Campus has been certified by the Oklahoma Department of Commerce as Site Ready, which allows the university to capitalize on fast-moving economic opportunities and enables site selectors to readily find quality land and facilities that meet nationally established criteria. OU's Research Campus was named the nation's top research park for 2013 by the Association of University Research Parks, placing it among such past recipients as Research Triangle Park in North Carolina, Purdue Research Park in Indiana and University City Science Center in Pennsylvania.

## **North Campus**

North campus, which is two miles north of the main campus, includes the Merrick Computer Center; Max Westheimer Airport, the University-operated airport that also serves the City of Norman; and Swearingen Research Park, where government agencies and industry have established facilities.

Other research and study units of the university include the Biological Station on Lake Texoma; the Sutton Avian Research Center in Bartlesville; the Oklahoma Geophysical Observatory at Leonard near Tulsa; the Aquatic Biology Fisheries Research Center in Noble near Norman; and the Oklahoma Biological Survey, the Oklahoma Archeological Survey and Charles M. Russell Center for the Study of Art of the American West in Norman. In addition, the Oklahoma Geological Survey is a state agency mandated in the Constitution of Oklahoma, and is part of the Mewbourne College of Earth and Energy at the University of Oklahoma.

#### **HEALTH SCIENCES CENTER**

The University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center is the state's major educational resource for training physicians, dentists, nurses, pharmacists, public health specialists and a wide range of allied health personnel. It is one of only four comprehensive academic health centers in the nation with seven professional colleges. The center is composed of the College of Allied Health, College of Dentistry, College of Medicine, College of Nursing, College of Pharmacy, College of Public Health and Graduate College.

Faculty and students use the clinical, laboratory and teaching facilities at the OU Medical Center, Veterans Administration Medical Center, The Children's Hospital at OU Medical Center, Presbyterian Hospital, Dean A. McGee Eye Institute, Oklahoma Department of Health, Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation, other affiliated hospitals in Oklahoma City, the major teaching hospitals in Tulsa, the Veterans Administration Hospital in Muskogee and various affiliated hospitals and clinics in other locations in Oklahoma. The Oklahoma Health Center is composed of the former Presbyterian Health Foundation Research Park and 30 other biomedical entities, including the OU Health Sciences Center as its centerpiece.

Also housed at the University of Oklahoma is OU Physicians, the state's largest physician group. The practice encompasses nearly every adult and child specialty. Many OU Physicians have expertise in the management of complex conditions. Such expertise is unavailable anywhere else in the state, region or sometimes even the nation. Some have pioneered surgical procedures or innovations in patient care that are world firsts. They also serve as faculty at the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine and train the region's future physicians.

The Peggy and Charles Stephenson Cancer Center represents the largest public-private biomedical initiative in Oklahoma history. The 210,000-square-foot facility provides patient-centered care by the largest and most experienced group of cancer specialists, offering the most advanced cancer detection and treatment technology. OU's Harold Hamm Diabetes Center is one of the top comprehensive diabetes centers in the world for adults and children with type 1 and type 2 diabetes, engaging in novel research aimed at progress toward a cure for diabetes and its complications.

#### **OU-TULSA SCHUSTERMAN CENTER**

The OU-Tulsa Schusterman Center is located in the heart of mid-town Tulsa at 41st and Yale. On this campus both the OU Health Sciences Center and the OU Norman Campus offer programs. The vision of OU-Tulsa is to build a nationally-recognized center of higher education excellence in select areas that emphasize strong campus-community partnerships and leverage unique opportunities and needs in the Tulsa region.

OU has a long history in the Tulsa area. The earliest program of the University of Oklahoma in Tulsa started in 1957 as a partnership with the Tulsa City-County Library. This program averaged 50 students a year and was one of the first programs to be part of the Tulsa Graduate Center, which became University Center at Tulsa in 1982. Recognizing the potential community impact of an expansion of OU services in Tulsa, the Oklahoma Legislature enacted Senate Bill 453 in 1972 that created a clinical branch of the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine in Tulsa. Today, the Tulsa campus enrolls medical students and trains 181 residents who conduct 200,000 patient visits annually at the college's ambulatory clinics.

Although OU's presence in Tulsa has been longstanding, it changed dramatically in 1999. As a result of the transformational \$10 million gift from the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation and the leadership of President David L. Boren, OU was able to purchase 60 acres at the corner of 41st and Yale, previously the BP-Amoco Research Center. The OU programs in Tulsa had been located in a wide variety of physical locations. By the fall of 2002, all OU academic programs in Tulsa were located at the Schusterman Center campus. This campus has allowed OU to better serve the community by providing a strong, centralized identity in Tulsa.

In February of 2008, the George Kaiser Family Foundation made a \$50 million gift to the OU College of Medicine in Tulsa allowing the College of Medicine to have the explicit focus to improve the health status of underserved communities. To reflect that change, the name of the College of Medicine in Tulsa was changed to the OU School of Community Medicine, the first in the nation. The School of Community Medicine remains an integral part of the OU College of Medicine. The University of Tulsa and the University of Oklahoma has welcomed its first class of students to the School of Community Medicine four-year educational track in Tulsa this past year. The Tandy Education Center was also recently opened and is a space that provides students the opportunity to practice lifelike circumstances using models and virtual reality. It is a state of the art facility that features the latest advances in medical simulation.

#### **COLLEGE OF CONTINUING EDUCATION**

The College of Continuing Education provides academic outreach opportunities to the state, region and nation. As the administrative unit for outreach at the University of Oklahoma, continuing education programs are the means by which the university extends its resources to the people of Oklahoma and beyond. By encompassing comprehensive, multidisciplinary academic services and programs that focus on the needs of adult learners, the College of Continuing Education offers both credit and non-credit courses, seminars, workshops, conferences, correspondence study, public service activities, and travel/study programs. The diversity and quality of the services available through continuing education programs provide an exciting and challenging academic experience.

OU became the first public university in U.S. history to be ranked No. 1 in freshman National Merit Scholars enrolled.

OU's fall-to-fall retention rate for freshmen was at a university all-time-high of 86.1 percent.

OU became the first public university in the nation to be awarded the prestigious Davis Cup two consecutive years in recognition of its record-setting enrollment of United World College international freshmen.

OU was the only Big 12 university to be selected as having one of America's 25 most beautiful campuses.

The freshman class was the academically highest ranked in OU history and in state history at a public university with an average 26.4 ACT for incoming freshmen.

The OU Honors College was named as one of the top 25 programs at a public university in the nation based on *A Review of Fifty Public University Honors Programs*.

OU received \$334,963,856 in private gifts and gifts-in-kind in the 2015 fiscal year, which included contributions from more than 1,030 corporate donors, 228 private foundations, and more than 37,975 alumni and friends of the university. This was the single, largest total ever raised by the university and more than doubled its 10-year average. This was also one of the highest numbers of donors to the university in recent years and is a result, in large part, of the launching of the Live On, University: 125th Anniversary Campaign for the University of Oklahoma.

Included in total gifts for the fiscal year were those of the annual Campus Campaign, in which more than 2,180 faculty, staff and retirees contributed \$2,317,554 to support scholarships and programs across all three OU campuses.

Of the overall total, donors helped OU reach more than half of its \$100 million scholarship campaign initiative, with a total amount of gifts at \$63.3 million. The scholarship gifts raised during this campaign brings the cumulative total of gifts and pledges raised for scholarships since 2004 to \$345,885,163.

Several major gifts given during fiscal year also helped OU reach the \$300 million mark for the first time in its history. In April, President Boren announced more than \$30 million in new resources to name the College of Engineering and establish a new School of Biomedical Engineering, including construction of a new academic building in the Engineering Quadrangle, and establishment of 12 new endowed positions and formation of a \$3.5 million endowment for graduate fellowships. The resources were made possible through major gifts from Janet and Jim Gallogly of Houston and Peggy and Charles Stephenson of Tulsa and the Stephenson Family Foundation.

In May, President Boren announced lead gifts of \$5 million each from Tim Headington of Dallas and Linda and Archie Dunham of Houston to help fund the construction of two innovative, living-learning centers on campus to house sophomores, juniors and seniors. OU was poised to, in fall 2017, become the first university in the state and one of the first public universities in the nation to adopt the residential college model.

The College of Nursing was named in honor of OU alumni Fran and Earl Ziegler of Dallas, Texas, whose lifetime contributions to the university and the College of Nursing was nothing short of exceptional.

OU-Tulsa opened the Tandy Education Center, a \$6.4 million, state-of the art simulation and education facility. It includes 10 exam rooms, two intensive care unit/emergency rooms with medical mannequins, a large multipurpose training room, and a furnished model apartment for simulations — the only one in Oklahoma.

OU was selected for the U.S. debut of an exhibition from the world's oldest museum, the Capitoline in Rome. Immortales: The Hall of the Emperors, a collection of 20 sculpted busts of emperors, empresses and patricians, has been in Rome for 2,000 years and was on exhibit for the first time in the United States at the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art.

In November, OU was named in the top 10 of the most impressive historic college campuses in the nation, according to College Values Online. OU was the only Big 12 University in the top 10, joining the ranks of other universities such as Princeton and University of California at Berkeley.

The Elsie C. Brackett Theatre, a renovated theater in the Rupel J. Jones Fine Arts Center that was originally completed in 1965, opened in October with a performance of the Tony Award-winning musical Ragtime.

OU dedicated the newly renovated Hester Hall, home of the OU College of International Studies, in a public ceremony in April. The newly renovated building featured the exterior renovation of the west façade, which became the new front door of the college and houses a two-story lobby, elevator and open stair. Another addition to the west façade was a new three-story element, which was renovated to house the dean's and staff offices and a quiet study area on the first floor. New faculty offices and small conference and seminar rooms are located on the second and third floors. The one-story element houses International Student Services and Education Abroad as well as three classrooms, a seminar room, a formal conference room and the college's living room.

OU was named as the 2015 Big 12 Conference Champion of the College and University Green Power Challenge for using more green power than any other school in the conference in rankings released in April by the U.S.

The Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps at OU celebrated its 75th anniversary during a spring commissioning ceremony. One of the oldest Naval ROTC programs in the nation, the OU NROTC has – during the past 75 years – under the supervision of 31 different commanding officers from the Navy and Marine Corps, produced over 4,000 Navy and Marine Corps officers.

In celebration of the university's 125th anniversary, the OU Press published The Sooner Story: The University of Oklahoma, 1890-2015. The book, by Anne Barajas Harp with a foreword by Carol J. Burr, tells OU's story by describing the challenges faced by each administration through the eyes of the president.

Dr. Leslie Hudson and Mr. Clifford Hudson of Oklahoma City gave a \$1 million gift to establish an endowment for two annual fellowships for graduate students in the College of Public Health.

Harold Hamm Diabetes Center received a \$2.5 million gift from the Chickasaw Nation to support diabetes research, patient care, and prevention. The Chickasaw Nation also gave \$500,000 to the College of Pharmacy to help combat the diabetes epidemic.

The Seed Sower Society, a distinguished group of donors whose cumulative gifts to the university total \$1 million or more, inducted new members, bringing to 206 the total of individuals, corporations and foundations who have been honored by the society.

The first class of 27 medical students who will complete all four years of their medical education at the OU-TU School of Community Medicine started classes in August. An educational track within the College of Medicine, in partnership with the University of Tulsa, the OU-TU School of Community Medicine focuses on community medicine with the implicit purpose to improve Oklahoma's poor health statistics.

1890 On December 19, Territorial Governor Steele approved bills for the location of three territorial schools: the university at Norman, the agricultural and mechanical school at Stillwater, and a normal school at Edmond. 1891 First Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma appointed by Governor Steele. 1892 David Ross Boyd, Superintendent of the Arkansas City, Kansas school system, became first president of the University of Oklahoma. On September 15, OU enrolled the first students. Of the 57 students who presented themselves for admission, not one qualified for freshman standing. Therefore, the university began its career as a preparatory school and continued as such for several years. 1893 First college freshman enrolled. School of Pharmacy founded in response to demands for pharmacists in the territory. First annual catalog published; four departments were advertised: Preparatory, Collegiate, Pharmaceutical, and Musical. 1894 Oklahoma Historical Society organized. 1896 First degree -- that of Pharmaceutical Chemist -- conferred. 1897 The first OU newspaper, *The Umpire*, began operations. 1898 First Bachelor of Arts degree conferred. University created four new divisions: Graduate work, Premedical work, School of Music, and the Summer School. First graduate students enrolled. 1899 Alumni Association organized. Territorial legislature authorized creation of a department of Geology and Natural History, which later became the Geological Survey. First honorary degree conferred. 1900 First Master of Arts degree conferred. First medical instruction offered. 1901 Major elective system, with prescribed work in English, French, or German, biology or chemistry, and history was adopted by College of Arts and Sciences. 1902 School of Fine Arts established from School of Music. 1903 First Bachelor of Science degree conferred. Funds donated by Andrew Carnegie for the construction of a university library. 1904 School of Applied Science with curricula in mechanical, electrical, and civil engineering established. First Rhodes Scholar from OU chosen.

  - University Extension Division organized for distance learning.
- 1916 The Oklahoma Daily, first daily student newspaper, began operations.

The National Weather Center – a unique partnership of OU and the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Norman-based weather research and operations programs – opened.

OU was named a Confucius Institute site.

The Department of Emergency Medicine was established at OU-Tulsa.

The Chickasaw and Choctaw nations committed funds for the creation of endowed faculty positions in OU diabetes research and clinical care programs.

2007 The number of endowed faculty positions increased to 445 in FY 2007.

The Schusterman Clinic opened at the OU-Tulsa Schusterman Center.

2007 A new research program focusing on the diseases of aging was established.

OU was selected by the U.S. Department of the Interior as the site of one of only eight regional climate science centers nationwide.

The Schusterman Center Library at OU-Tulsa was dedicated.

The School of Industrial Engineering was renamed the School of Industrial and Systems Engineering.

For the first time in OU history, OU students won the Rhodes, Marshall and Mitchell scholarships in the same year.

OU journalism professor and foreign correspondent Mike Boettcher was awarded two Emmys for his coverage of the war in Afghanistan, marking the first time an active university professor also serving as a war correspondent has won an Emmy.

An OU assistant professor and colleagues announced that they had identified two white dwarf stars considered the oldest and closest known to man. According to the researcher, these stars are the closest known examples of the oldest stars in the Universe forming soon after the Big Bang.

OU launched One University, an initiative embracing digital technologies to create an even more dynamic classroom experience for its students.

OU was named the 2012 Big 12 Conference Champion for using more green power than any other school in the Big 12 Conference, according to standings released by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. OU later was recognized as one of only four organizations nationwide to be selected as a Green Power Partner of the Year by the EPA.

Norman campus faculty achieved a record number of research awards in FY 2012, topping \$93 million for the first time in the university's history.

The Harold Hamm International Prize for Biomedical Research in Diabetes was established.

The first Peggy Dow Helmerich Scholarships were awarded to 46 students in the Peggy Dow Helmerich School of Drama.

The University of Oklahoma implemented flat-rate tuition and mandatory fees for full-time undergraduate students carrying between 12 and 21 credit hours per semester to enable them to graduate sooner.

The university announced it would begin using the Common Application, effective with the academic year beginning fall 2014, for incoming freshmen.

The University of Oklahoma became the first public university in the nation to be awarded the prestigious Davis Cup in recognition of its record-setting enrollment of United World College international freshmen. OU's 45 Davis United World College Scholars also represented the largest class ever enrolled at a Davis UWC Scholars Program partner institution.

The OU Research Campus was named the nation's top research park for 2013 by the Association of University Research Parks.

Headington Hall, a six-story, 230,000-square-foot residence hall for 380 students, including 180 student-athletes, opened in August 2013.

A first-ever grant from the GRAMMY Foundation to OU's American Organ Institute Archive and Library allowed for the preservation and public access to a unique organ recording collection. The collection consists of 760 original and irreplaceable master organ player rolls produced by the Möller Pipe Organ Company in the early 1920s.

The Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art began offering complimentary admission to the public, due to a gift from the OU Athletics Department.

OU's History of Science Collections acquired *Tractatus de sphaera*, a manuscript written by Oratio Grassi, a leading astronomer in Rome at the height of Galileo's astronomical discoveries.

OU had the largest number of freshman National Merit Scholars ever enrolled at the University with 311 scholars.

OU was the only Big 12 university selected as having one of America's 25 most beautiful campuses.

The Radar Innovations Laboratory was dedicated in a public ceremony.

In a White House ceremony, the Institute for Museum and Library Services awarded the Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History with the 2014 National Medal for Museum and Library Service. OU was one of only five museums and five libraries nationwide to receive the nation's highest honor conferred on museums and libraries for service to the community.

The first ever anaerobic structural biology program in the United States was created. The OU-Einstein Research Consortium's focus would be on advancing groundbreaking research with biomedical relevance in an unexplored area and would establish an Institute of Structural Biology in the Stephenson Life Sciences Research Center on OU's Research Campus.

The lower level of the Neustadt Wing of Bizzell Memorial Library was renovated to create the Peggy V. Helmerich Collaborative Learning Center.

OU was selected to serve as Secretariat for the U.S. Department of State's Diplomacy Lab program. As Secretariat, OU would serve as the coordinator for all universities selected to participate in the nationwide program.

OU's Licensing Department was named as the recipient of the 2014 Synergy Award: Program of the Year, in recognition of the university's pioneering work in teaching and practical experience for its students in the area of intellectual property in sports.

The University of Oklahoma achieved an 80 percent graduation rate overall for student-athletes, the highest mark ever recorded by the Sooners since the NCAA began tracking this data.







#### Total Recipients and Dollar Amounts







# Headcount of Degree Recipients by College,



#### Percent of Faculty Who Are Tenured


