




# **Significance**

PBS visualization of data from Edwards et al., PNAS 2019


- Principal Research Question
  - What do social media platforms such as Twitter tell us about the dynamics that have facilitated a global awakening on policing communities of color?







#### **Approach: Building team capacity**

  - Link scholarship to institutions and advocacy groups
















# Why OU?

- Acute local relevance
  - The OKC police department kills Black men at a rate higher than the US murder rate.
  - Impacts on Native American communities
  - Norman police budgeting + backlash
- OU should be a national leader on this topic.
- Transdisciplinary team with unique skill set to do powerful, original, distinctive work

Edwards et al., PNAS 2019, data from 2013-2018




#### **Prospects for Future Funding**











- During BIC period:
  - NEH Collaborative Research Grant, up to \$100k for conference and publication
  - NSF Collaborative Research Grant: Accountable Institutions & Behavior or Law & Science
- Digital humanities: expanding skills, infrastructure and access
  - American Council for Learned Societies (ACLS) Digital Extension Grant (up to \$150k)
  - NEH Institute for Advanced Topics in the Digital Humanities Grant (up to \$250k)
  - NEH Digital Humanities Advancement Grant (OU applies as an organization; up to \$375k)
- Later phases: NIH / Robert Wood Johnson
  - Police killings as a public health issue
  - Support for research on attitudes about gun ownership
